The volunteers worked from the safety of their own homes. They had the option of using some left- over cards or buying new. No stamps were needed. Completed cards were delivered on Wednesday, Dec. 16 between 10:00AM and noon to the De Pere Community center. All of the cards went to the facility directors for distribution on Dec. 17.
