COMMUNITY SERVICE FOOD PANTRY COLLECTION



The January 17 food pantry collection will benefit Hope Center Pantry (formerly known as St. Patrick's Pantry) located at 505 Clinton Street. The pantry is completely run by volunteers and serves residents of Brown County. No income verification is necessary, just proof of

address. In November, the pantry served 417 clients for a total of 1,489 family members.

The pantry is open Monday – Thursday from 1-3PM. Items currently needed include: canned soups (including cream of mushroom, chicken or celery), pasta, pasta sauce, cans of pasta with meat, peanut butter, kids' snacks such as Goldfish crackers or fruit bits, Pringles, microwave popcorn, sugar, cake mixes, dish and laundry soap, shampoo, conditioner, body wash, hand lotion, sanitary pads and tissues. We will be collecting donations from 10AM-12:45PM at the De Pere Community Center.

Each year when we collect for the Hope Center (Quad Parishes Food Pantry), members are invited to donate "birthday bags" for the children who will have birthdays during the year. Contents of a birthday bag include: a cake mix, frosting mix or container, a birthday card for a child and a small, inexpensive toy. This may be in lieu of non-perishable food or in addition to the food. This provides great joy to parents who cannot afford to treat their children with a cake or gift.

BUILDING QUILTS FOR HABITAT FOR HUMANITY

The requirements for a family to acquire a home through Greater Green Bay Habitat for Humanity:

Need for Improved Housing: Based on current housing conditions, there must be a demonstrated need in order to qualify for a Habitat home.

Ability to Pay: In the Homeownership Program, applicants are applying to purchase a home.

Applicants must fall within 30-80% of Brown County's Area Median Income (AMI), based on family size, and have a reliable source of income (employment, SSI, etc.) to pay an affordable, interest-free mortgage.

Willingness to Partner: Must be willing to complete 250-500 volunteer hours (based on number of homebuyers) building their home, be a community partner, and represent Habitat for Humanity in a positive manner within the community.

The requirements for a lap-size guilt presented to a new homeowner by BCCWC:

Lap-size quilt: approximately 53 x 57 inches (similar to a living room throw).

Must contain a picture of a house, either imprinted on fabric or from a pattern.

Complete the quilt top and supply the backing material which should be 4 inches bigger on each side than the top.


(No need to supply batting - Thanks to the BCCWC for awarding our group funds to purchase batting at the NWTC Artisans Center.)

Machine Quilting will be done for you: Gina Reinardy, 664-6501, takes the quilt to the NWTC Artisans Center for machine quilting by volunteer, Lynn Konitzer. After machine quilting, Gina returns the quilt to you with a label.

Finishing the quilt: Hand sewing of the binding will be done for you by volunteers.

It's an easy and fun project for anyone who enjoys sewing.

BOOK CLUB

This is the perfect time to make a resolution to read more, learn something new and join a new group of friends. The BCCWC book club makes it easy to do all three! Join us for the first meeting of 2024 on January 8 at 1PM at the Weyers-Hilliard Branch - Howard Library (please note the date and location which are different than normal). We will be discussing The Wright Sister by Patty Dann. On December 17, 1903, Orville and Wilbur Wright flew the world's first airplane at Kitty Hawk, North Carolina, establishing the Wright Brothers as world-renowned pioneers of flight. Known to far fewer people was their whip-smart and well-educated sister Katharine, a suffragette and early feminist.

Book Summary:



After Wilbur passed away, Katharine lived with and took care of her increasingly reclusive brother Orville, who often turned to his more confident and supportive sister to help him through fame and fortune. But when Katharine became engaged to their mutual friend, Harry Haskell, Orville felt abandoned and betrayed. He smashed a pitcher of flowers against a wall and refused to attend the wedding or speak to Katharine or Harry. As the years went on, the siblings grew further and further apart.

In *The Wright Sister*, Patty Dann wonderfully imagines the blossoming of Katharine, revealed in her "Marriage Diary"—in which she emerges as a frank, vibrant, intellectually and socially engaged, sexually active woman coming into her own—and her one-sided correspondence with her estranged brother as she hopes to repair their fractured relationship. Even though she pictures "Orv" throwing her letters away, Katharine cannot

contain her joie de vivre, her love of married life, her strong advocacy of the suffragette cause, or her abiding affection for her stubborn sibling as she fondly recalls their shared life.

An inspiring and poignant chronicle of feminism, family and forgiveness, *The Wright Sister* is an unforgettable portrait of a woman, a sister of inventors, who found a way to reinvent herself.

Since we can't control the weather and know that old man winter is certainly on his way, here are the next couple of books to read: on February 5, we will be talking about *Fresh Water for Flowers* by Valerie Perrine and March 4 will find us discussing *The Girls in the Stilt House* by Kelly Mustain. So, mark your calendar and join us for lively conversation on a cold winter day.
