We will be servings meals again this year at both shelters, the Men's Shelter on St. John Street next to the church and the Women's Shelter at 700 E. Walnut Street. As a reminder, the dates are November 6, December 4, February 5, March 5, and April 2, 2026.

We had a wonderful sign up for the year at our Fall Luncheon meeting, but we still have a big need for our November 6 meal, as follows:

WOMEN'S: 1 server; 1 salad; 2 people for 2 loaves each of garlic bread

<u>MEN'S</u>: 2 servers; 2 party-size lasagnas; 4 large vegetables; 3 large salads; 2 people for 2 garlic breads each; 2 desserts; 4 gallons of milk; 4 large bottles of juice.

You still have time to sign up for the November meal and for the season at our October 15 meeting or contact either of us ahead of time. If you have already signed up to take food to the Men's Shelter in November, perhaps you could also bring milk or juice as well. Just let us know. Even if you don't attend club meetings, you can always donate food for the meals. If you are new to the club or would just like more information about what this community service is all about, please feel free to contact either of us any time. We are always happy to explain how our club contributes to the 2 shelters.

All food needs to be prepared and ready to serve. We do not cook there; we use their warming ovens. Remember to bring dressing with your pre-assembled salads, and bringing garlic bread means 2 loaves, heated, pre-cut, and wrapped in foil.

Please deliver food to the shelters between 5PM-5:30PM. Servers should arrive by 5:15PM.

We always enjoy serving food at the shelters and we are grateful for your continued generosity as we fulfill this need in our community.

BUILDING QUILTS FOR HABITAT FOR HUMANITY

Guidelines for quilts:

Lap-Size Quilt: Measurements are typically 48 X 50, 52, 54, 56 or 60 X 60 – nothing much bigger. It should be similar to a throw for a living room.

Batting & Thread: Through a Thrivent Grant, the batting and thread are supplied by the machine quilter.

House Requirement: Each quilt should contain a picture or pattern of a house. A house could be incorporated onto the quilt backing if a favorite quilt pattern without a house is used for the quilt front.

Backing Requirement: Backing material should be 4 inches bigger on each side than the top.

Machine quilting process: Contact Gina Reinardy, 920-664-6501, who will take your quilt to our volunteer machine quilter, Lynn Konitzer. Gina will pick up your quilt, return it to you, and give you a label.

Binding process: You sew the binding and label on your quilt. Call one of the following binders to handstitch the binding:

BOOK CLUB

Please join us on Monday, October 6, from 1-2:30PM at the Green Bay East Branch Library in meeting room West (EA) for the next BCCWC Book Club! Our October book selection is *The Frozen River* by Ariel Lawhon who is a *New York Times*-bestselling author of *I Was Anastasia* and *Code Name Helene. The Frozen River* is a gripping historical mystery inspired by the life and diary of Martha Ballard, a renowned 18th-century midwife who defied the legal system and wrote herself into American history.



Book Summary:

Maine, 1789: The Kennebec River freezes, entombing a man in the ice. Martha Ballard is summoned to examine the body and determine cause of death. As the local midwife and healer, Martha is good at keeping secrets. Her diary is a record of every birth and death, every murder and debacle that unfolds in the town of Hallowell. In that diary she also documented the details of an alleged rape that occurred four months earlier. Now, one of the men accused of that heinous attack has been found dead in the ice.

While Martha is certain she knows what happened the night of the assault, she suspects that the two crimes are linked, and that there is more to both cases than meets the eye. Over the course of one long, hard winter, as the trial nears, and whispers and prejudices mount, Martha's diary lands at the center of the scandal and threatens to tear both her family and her community apart.

Our November 3 meeting will find us reading *Remarkably Bright Creatures* by Shelby Van Pelt so mark your calendar and plan to join us at the Kress Library that day!


